of Abdu'l Baha, raises serious concerns about the trust and confidence the Baha'i community has in the current administration.

This decline begs the question: Who is to be blamed for this disinterest and detachment? It seems evident that the core issue lies in the deviation from the original teachings of Baha'u'llah and Abdu'l Baha. The rigid enforcement of Shoghi Effendi's interpretations and the overreach of the illegitimate UHJ, which has prioritized monetary gain over spiritual growth, have alienated many believers. This sad reality is a stark reminder of the consequences of straying from the authentic messages of Baha'u'llah and the Master.

It is crucial to acknowledge that the Free Baha'i community remains committed to preserving the true essence of Baha'u'llah's teachings. We do not measure our success by numbers or financial contributions, but by our adherence to the spiritual principles laid down by Baha'u'llah and the Bab. Our focus is on genuine teaching and living the Faith, free from administrative manipulations and financial exploitation.

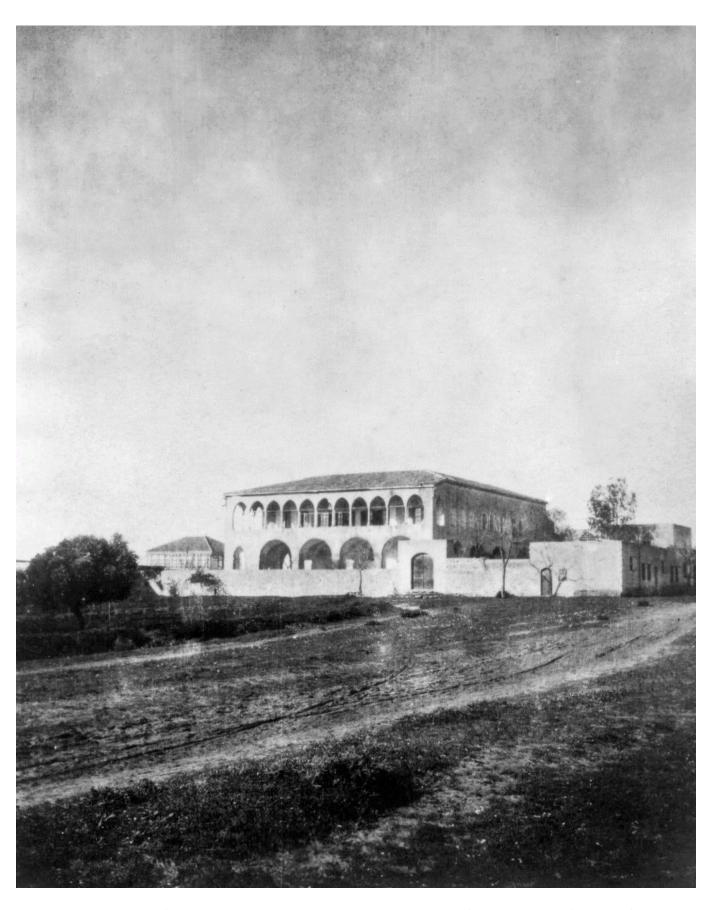

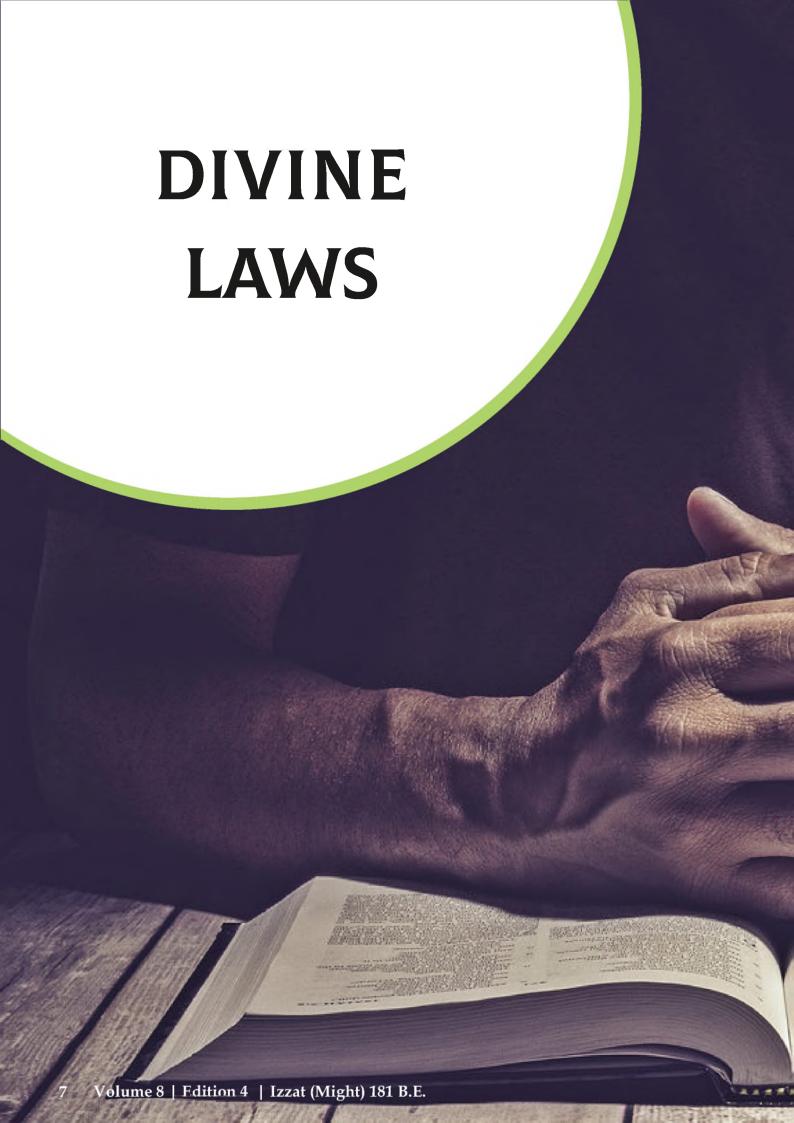
Mansion of Bahji where Baha'u'llah spent the final years of His life

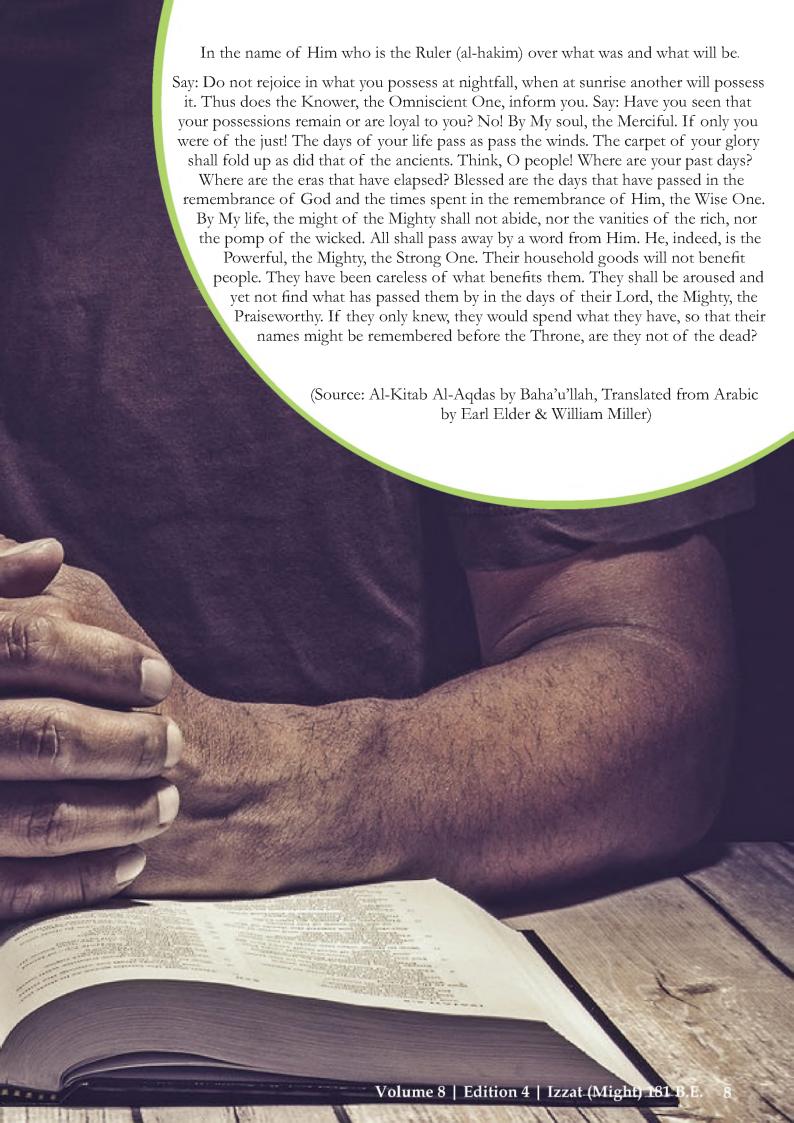


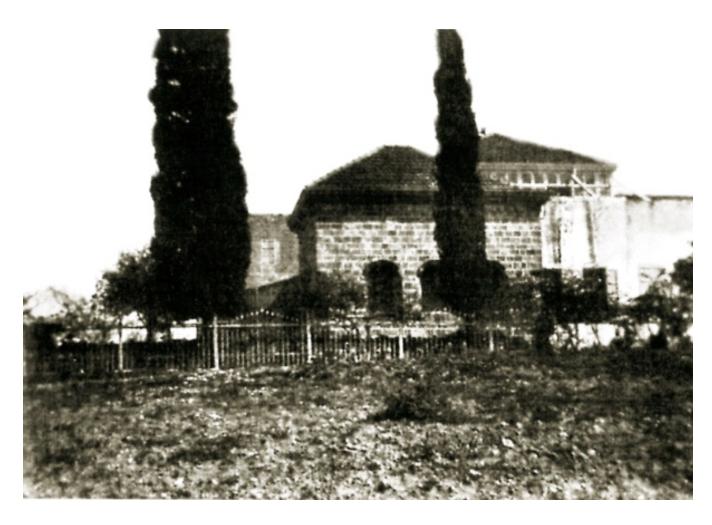
MISTAKE

"The words of the House of Justice are boring and no one should care for it"

"Spirituality and dedication to the faith has no bearing on one's faith and loyalty to the covenant"

Those were the paraphrased words of the administration representative who "graced" our local feast this month. As it happened, this event also served as the venue for electing national delegates. As expected from the local assembly, it featured a red-carpet reception with the typical flattery one anticipates when an administration representative visits.

However, this administration representative revealed the core of their stance when she proudly declared that the faithful no longer care about what the UHJ has to say. Mimicking boredom and acknowledging the dull response to the UHJ's words, she confidently stated that the faithful no longer care for messages from the House and avoid discussing them because they find them boring. How nice!

The members of the administration are now openly acknowledging what the faithful have known for a long time. The words of the UHJ are plain and simply irrelevant, constituting a collection of high-sounding yet meaningless words.

Next came the bigger revelation. She declared, referring to the March 2007 message of the UHJ, that those who vote are considered faithful and loyal Baha'is. Think about it for a moment. Prayers? No. Fasting? No. Reading and deepening? No. Teaching? No. But what makes you a loyal and faithful Baha'i? Voting!

This was a blow to the generational Baha'is who have dedicated their lives and resources to the faith. Some of us devoted our entire lives to the cause, and others contributed their resources. But no! According to the administration, you are considered faithful if you participate in their electoral charade. Additionally, this administration representative urged all Baha'is to reconsider their choices if they have already voted for someone loyal to the administration.



At this point, I as a Free Baha'i would add my thought – Abdu'l Baha, a central figure in the faith, never participated in voting. Should we then question his loyalty and faithfulness?

Finally, it wouldn't surprise me if the diehard Haifan Baha'is, those who've been fervently supporting the Administration, start questioning the Master or twist his words to match the stance of the UHJ or the Administration. It appears their aim is to sidestep independent truth-seeking, a fundamental aspect of Baha'i teachings. They rally behind the Administration, branding anyone who questions them as anti-faith or even a covenant breaker.

Thankfully, our allegiance remains unwaveringly aligned with the teachings of Baha'u'llah, and we won't back down no matter what. May Baha'u'llah bless us with the strength and courage to stay true to the path he has illuminated.

An honest question: What cancels or annuls ablutions? Please support with bahai text. Thank you.

Answer:

Hi,

Allah'u'Abha!

The specified paragraph from the Kitab-i-Aqdas does not explicitly mention what actions or conditions annul ablutions. The passage states:

"It has been ordained that whoever professes the religion of God, the Rewarder (al-dayyan), should wash his hands every day, then his face, and sit facing toward God and say ninety-five times, 'Allahu abha' (God is most Splendid). So did the Former (fatir) of the heavenly command as He sits on the Thrones of the Names (al-asrna') with Greatness and Power. In like

manner, perform ablutions before Worship because of a command from God, the Only One, the Choosing One."

This paragraph provides specific instructions for daily ablutions and emphasizes the importance of ritual washing before worship:

Daily Washing: It is ordained that adherents of the Baha'i Faith should wash their hands and face every day. This act of cleanliness is not only physical but also has spiritual significance, symbolizing purity and readiness to engage in prayer and communion with God.

Facing Towards God: After performing the ablutions, believers are instructed to sit facing towards God. This act signifies devotion, reverence, and orientation towards the Divine presence.

Recitation of Allah'u'Abha: Believers are

instructed to recite "Allah'u'Abha" (God is most Splendid) ninety-five times. This repeated invocation serves as a form of meditation and a way to center oneself in the presence of God.

Ablutions Before Worship: The passage also stresses the importance of performing ablutions before engaging in worship. This reinforces the concept that physical cleanliness is a prerequisite for spiritual acts, aligning the physical and spiritual states.

However, the passage does not provide specific details about what might cancel or annul ablutions. The focus is on the positive actions of performing ablutions and the spiritual discipline involved.

While this passage from the Kitab-i-Aqdas emphasizes the ritual and spiritual significance of ablutions, it does not specify actions or conditions that might annul them.

Is it permissible to beg for money in the Baha'i Faith, and how should we respond if someone asks us for money?

Answer:

Dear Friend,

In the Baha'i Faith, begging for money is explicitly forbidden. The Kitab-i-Aqdas provides clear guidance on this matter:

"It is not permissible to beg, and when one is asked (for money), it is forbidden for him to give. It has been ordained that every one earn his living. Whoever is unable to do so, let the guardians and the rich appoint for him what is sufficient. Perform the stipulations and ordinances of God. Then keep them as you keep your eyes, and be not among the losers."

This passage emphasizes several key principles:

Prohibition of Begging: Begging is not allowed within the Baha'i Faith. Every individual is encouraged to earn their living through honest work and effort. This principle underscores the value of self-reliance and the dignity of labor.

Prohibition of Giving to Beggars: It is also forbidden to give money to those who beg. This directive aligns with the broader principle of encouraging self-sufficiency and discouraging dependency.

Support for Those in Need: For those who are genuinely unable to earn a living due to circumstances beyond their control, the community has a responsibility. The guardians and the wealthy are called upon to provide sufficient support for such individuals. This reflects the Baha'i emphasis

on social justice and the importance of community support.

Adherence to Divine Ordinances: The passage concludes by urging believers to faithfully perform and uphold the ordinances of God, likening this adherence to the care one would take of their own eyes. This metaphor illustrates the importance and value of these divine instructions.

In essence, the Baha'i teachings promote a balanced approach to social welfare. While encouraging self-reliance and hard work, they also mandate community support for those who genuinely cannot support themselves. This balanced approach aims to create a society where every individual can live with dignity and security.

If Baha'u'llah was himself the promised one, why did he accept Babism? I am a Baha'i myself, but this question has stuck in my mind. Would be great if you can answer it, please.

Answer:

Allah'u'Abha!

Your question touches on a crucial aspect of Baha'i history and theology. To understand why Baha'u'llah accepted Babism, even though He was Himself the promised one, it is essential to delve into the relationship between the Bab and Baha'u'llah and the progression of the Baha'i Faith from Babism.

1. The Bab's Mission and Baha'u'llah's Acceptance:

The Bab (Siyyid 'Ali Muhammad) declared Himself to be the Qa'im ("He Who Arises"), the Mahdi of Islamic prophecy, and the forerunner of "Him Whom God shall make manifest." The Bab's mission was to prepare the way for a new Divine Messenger who would bring a more comprehensive revelation. This concept is clearly articulated in the Baha'i Writings:

"The substance wherewith He (the Bab) hath in this day entrusted the bearers of His name is the seed of His own Self, and the bounty wherewith He hath favoured them is the same bounty as hath been lavished upon His own chosen ones." – Baha'u'llah, Gleanings from the Writings of Baha'u'llah, p. 10.

Baha'u'llah recognized the Bab as a Divine Messenger and accepted His teachings, understanding that the Bab's mission was to herald His own coming. Baha'u'llah's acceptance of Babism was a testament to the Bab's role in the Divine Plan and His own station as the one promised by the Bab.

2. The Unfolding of Divine Revelation:

Baha'i teachings emphasize the concept of progressive revelation, where each Divine Messenger builds upon the revelations of previous Messengers. The Bab's revelation was meant to pave the way for Baha'u'llah's more complete and universal teachings. Baha'u'llah Himself explains this continuity and progression:

"The Revelation of which I am the bearer is only an affirmation of the truth that the Bab hath previously announced. That which God hath revealed in His Book is the unerring Balance established amongst men." – Baha'u'llah, The Kitab-i-Aqdas, para. 183.

Baha'u'llah saw the Bab's teachings as preparatory, leading humanity towards His own revelation. By accepting Babism, Baha'u'llah affirmed the legitimacy and divine origin of the Bab's mission.

3. Fulfillment of Prophecy:

The Bab explicitly prophesied the coming of "Him Whom God shall make manifest." Baha'u'llah's acceptance of the Bab's mission was an acknowledgment of this prophecy and an integral part of fulfilling it. This fulfillment is a significant aspect of Baha'i belief:

"The Báb bade His followers fix their gaze upon Him Whom God would make manifest, and declared that His Revelation was but a gateway to the supreme Revelation of His promised Successor." – Baha'u'llah, Gleanings from the Writings of Baha'u'llah, p. 24.

The Bab's prophecies and teachings set the

stage for Baha'u'llah's declaration and the establishment of the Baha'i Faith.

4. Baha'u'llah's Recognition and Declaration:

Baha'u'llah's own writings reflect His recognition of the Bab and the connection between their missions. Initially, Baha'u'llah did not openly declare His station to avoid confusion and persecution of the early believers. However, once the time was ripe, He declared His mission:

"I am the One Whom the tongue of Isaiah hath extolled, the One with Whose name, both the Torah and the Evangel were adorned." – Baha'u'llah, Epistle to the Son of the Wolf, p. 78.

Baha'u'llah's acceptance of Babism and subsequent declaration were part of a divinely ordained process designed to guide humanity through progressive stages of spiritual development.

In conclusion, Baha'u'llah's acceptance of Babism was a crucial step in the unfolding of a larger divine plan. It demonstrated the continuity of divine guidance, the legitimacy of the Bab's mission, and the progressive nature of revelation. This sequence of events allowed for the establishment of a new world order as envisioned by Baha'u'llah, fulfilling the promises of the Bab and furthering the spiritual evolution of humanity.

Should we contribute towards the different kinds of funds introduced in the Baha'i Faith? I have stopped giving Huquq'ullah to the LSA but still contribute towards temple funds, specifically towards 'Abdu'l-Baha's shrine. However, my heart is not fully into it, and after the fire incident at the shrine, I have been slightly disheartened. There was no report shared by the UHJ on the financial loss incurred or how much more will be needed to complete the construction. It seems these funds are just a means to generate money, especially since no accounts are being submitted. What is the Free Baha'i perspective on this?

From the Free Baha'i perspective, we believe that the financial practices and the handling of contributions by the current Baha'i Administration deviate significantly from the core teachings of Baha'u'llah. It's a clear case of fraud on the part of the Baha'i leadership. I remember when I was still a Baha'i and I settled in Haltom City, Texas. After I noted my address change to the NSA, I began reciving mailings from them and was asked to form a Baha'i "group". The mailings included a list of about ten or eleven other Baha'is that were supposed to be in the same city as me. The data indicated that most of them declared in the 1970s. I tried to contact these other Baha'is, but without success. I later concluded the names and addresses were fake.

Even in my previous city, North Richland Hills, there were three or four members of the community (out of about a dozen) that were never seen at feasts or holy day events.

Things like these were items that were on my shelf for a long time before it finally broke at the end of 2004.

Dead addresses align Baha'i demographics with the US population!?



In 1854, facing intense persecution, Baha'u'llah chose to leave Baghdad and retreat into the solitude of the Sulaymaniyyih mountains. Disguised as a dervish, he lived in anonymity, far from the turmoil and oppression that had befallen him and his followers. Initially, the local inhabitants were unaware of his true identity and regarded him with suspicion. Our Master has clearly stated,

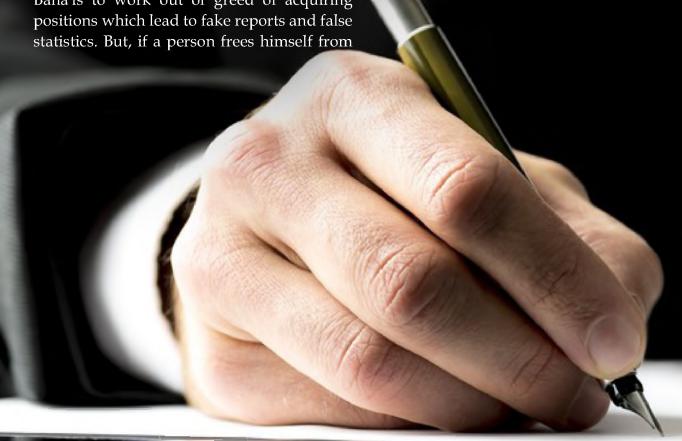
