
BROKEN PIECES



BREAKING AWAY: MY JOURNEY FROM MAINSTREAM TO FREE BAHA'I FAITH

My name is John, and I am currently 47 years old. I was raised in the United States as a Baha'i and accepted the Baha'i faith when I was only 23, through a close friend of mine whose entire family was actively involved in the community. My friend and her family taught me the importance of Baha'i teachings while I was young, and I grew up with a strong connection to my faith. However, as I got older, I became more curious about the different sects within the Baha'i faith and started to do my own research.

At first, I was drawn to the Free Baha'i sect. I found their beliefs and practices to be more in line with my own personal values, and I appreciated the emphasis they placed on social justice and community involvement. However, I was hesitant to fully embrace the Free Baha'i faith, as I knew it would be a major departure from the mainstream institution in which I was raised.

Despite my reservations, I continued to learn more about the Free Baha'i teachings. I was struck by the depth and complexity of their beliefs and began to see how many of the things I had taken for granted in my upbringing were not necessarily universal to all Baha'is.

One day, after a particularly enlightening conversation with a friend from a Free Baha'i background, I made the decision to accept the Free Baha'i teachings. Despite the challenges I faced in the face of social boycotts from my friends, I never regretted my decision to accept the core teachings of the cause. I felt that it had given me a deeper understanding of my faith and a



stronger connection to Baha'u'llah.

However, as I became more involved in the teachings, I began to encounter some eyeopening facts about the history of the Baha'i faith and the differences between Haifans and Free Baha'i beliefs. I learned about the early conflicts between the two sects and how those conflicts have shaped the Baha'i faith today.

I was also shocked to discover some of the prejudices and misconceptions that existed within the Haifan community about the Free Baha'is. I realized that many Haifans had a distorted view of Free Baha'i beliefs and practices.

Eventually, I came to the difficult decision to leave the mainstream Baha'i faith altogether. It was not a decision I made lightly, as I had many friends within the Haifan community. But I felt that I could no longer ignore the differences between the Haifan and Free Baha'i beliefs and that I needed to be true to my own convictions.

Leaving the Haifans was a difficult process for me, but I felt a sense of liberation as well. I was now free to fully embrace the Baha'i teachings and read and implement the core teachings of Baha'u'llah and the Master, and to work towards building a more inclusive and unified world. I was free to question anything and everything wrong in the faith and, at the same time, not get excommunicated by anyone. I know that my journey is far from over, but I am excited to see where it will take me next.

The Free Baha'is believe that the true teachings of Baha'u'llah and Abdu'l Baha are a beacon of hope and light in a world that is


increasingly divided and polarized. They believe that the message of unity, love, and peace that Baha'u'llah brought to the world is more relevant today than ever before.

Is fasting and performing prayers is mandatory as per the Baha'is too? Can you please clarify.

Answer:

HiSR,

Allah'u'Abha!

Hope this message finds you well. I am glad to hear from you after a long time. I understand that you are seeking clarification on a certain matter, and we the Free Baha'is are here to assist you in any way we can.

In regards to your query, I would like to refer to an extract from Kitab-i-Aqdas which I believe can provide further insight and clarity. The extract is as follows:

"Worship and Fasting are obligatory to you on your coming to maturity a command from God, your Lord and the Lord of your early fathers. Whoever is weak from illness or advanced age, God exempts him because of a Grace on His part. He is the Generous One, the Forgiver. God permits you to prostrate yourselves on everything pure, and we have taken away the ruling stipulated in the Book. God knows and you do not. Whoever does not find water, let him repeat five times, "bi-smillah, al- athar, al-athar" (In the name of God, the Purest, the Purest,) and then begin worship. This is what the Master of the worlds commanded. In those lands where nights and days are long they may perform worship by (using) clocks and objects which determine the times. He is the Wise One, the Explainer."

In the subsequent passages, there are specific prayers mentioned that Baha'is are discharged from performing. I would be happy to elaborate on these further and provide you with the necessary information.

The passages in question states the following:

"We have exempted you from worship (on the occasion) of wonders. Whenever they appear, make mention of God with greatness and power. He is the Hearing One, the Seeing One. Say: "al-'azama lillah, rabb ma yura wa wa ma la yura, rabb al-'alamin" (Greatness belongs to God, the Lord of what is seen and what is unseen, the Lord of the worlds)."

"Worship as individuals has been ordained for you; the commandment regarding group worship is remitted (rufi'a), except in worship for the dead. He is the Wise One, the Commanding One."

I have a question regarding Baha'i inheritance laws. My uncle, a fellow Baha'i, recently passed away, and his property is being divided among his close relatives. I took care of him extensively before my marriage, even though he had daughters. Do the Baha'i laws entitle me to any share of his inheritance? I reached out to the LSA for help, but they were unable to assist me. Can you provide any guidance on this matter?

Answer:

Hi Jenny,

Allah'u'Abha!

Certainly. And to answer your question, would like to take help from the Holy Book of Baha'u'llah. If we look at the Kitab-i-Aqdas, it suggests that while God commands people to love their relatives, this does not necessarily translate into a right to a share of one's property. It emphasizes the importance of loving one's family and maintaining strong relationships, while also recognizing the importance of personal property rights.

"Indeed, God has commanded you to love your relatives, but He has not decreed for them a right in one's property. He has no need of the worlds."

This passage can be interpreted as a reminder that love for one's family should be based on an intrinsic desire to show affection and care for them, rather than an obligation to share one's material possessions with them. It also suggests that the ultimate authority over one's property lies with God, and that he has no need for material possessions or worldly goods.

In essence, the extract emphasizes the importance of balancing the love and care for one's family with the need to respect

individual property rights. It serves as a reminder that one should be generous and kind to their relatives, but also mindful of their personal property and the need to maintain a fair balance between family obligations and individual rights. Hope that answers your question.

Hey, I have a situation and I'd love to hear your thoughts. So, I'm in love with this amazing girl who isn't a Baha'i, and we want to get married. But her parents are totally against it. Do you think it's worth going against their wishes and getting married anyway? And, will our marriage be considered valid under Baha'i laws?

Answer:

Hi Paul,

Allah'u'Abha!

Based on the teachings of Baha'u'llah, consent of both parties is a necessary condition for marriage. While Baha'u'llah desired love, affection, and unity among people, He also made it dependent on the consent of both the parents and the couple to prevent any potential discord or ill will. Therefore, if you and your partner decide to go against her parents' wishes and get married without their consent, it may not be recognized as a valid marriage under Baha'i laws.

Let's look at the extract from the Kitab-i-Aqdas for a clear understanding.

"Indeed, in al-Bayan He made the consent of the two parties the condition (for marriage). Since We desired love and affection and the union of the creatures, We made (marriage) dependent on the consent of the parents in addition to the two of them (the bride and groom), lest there occur rancour and hatred. And We have other aims and so is the matter decided."

I have noticed that despite repeated requests, many people are unable to obtain the account of the Huququ'llah funds collected by the Universal House of Justice (UHJ). What steps would Team Free Baha'is recommend for addressing this issue?

Answer:

Allah'u'Abha!

If efforts to obtain the account of Huququ'llah funds collected by the UHJ have been unsuccessful, it may be necessary to escalate the matter to lower authorities within the Baha'i community. This could include contacting the National Spiritual Assembly or the International Teaching Center for guidance and support and indirectly put pressure on the UHJ to act on the same. It may also be helpful to gather support from other concerned individuals and groups, and to advocate for greater transparency and accountability in the handling of Baha'i funds.

One important step that we could take to ensure prompt implementation is to establish clear deadlines for submission, and follow up on any missed deadlines. This could involve engaging key Baha'i contributors to the fund to raise questions in meetings, and ensuring that these discussions are recorded in the meeting minutes for follow-up at subsequent meetings with stakeholders.

Ultimately, it is important to approach the situation with humility, patience, and a commitment to upholding the principles and values of the Baha'i Faith.

BLAST FROM THE PAST

ALBERT EINSTEIN SAYS-

"Let me begin by stating this political conviction: that the State exists for man, not man for the State. The same may be said of economic institutions. This is an old principle, laid down by those who rated human personality as the highest of human values. I should hesitate to restate it if it were not constantly in danger of being forgotten, especially in this era of organization and standardization. I believe that the most important mission of the State is to protect the individual and to make it possible for him to develop into a creative personality.

"The State should be our servant; we should not be slaves of the State. The State violates this precept when it forces us to perform military service, especially when this servile employment has for its purpose the destruction of men of other countries or the infringement of their freedom. We should make only such sacrifices for the State as contribute to the free development of the human individual. These statements may be accepted as obvious by every American; but they are not so accepted by every European; therefore our hope is that the fight against war will be strongly supported by Americans."



Baha'u'llah was known for His compassion and generosity towards the poor and needy. He would often give away His own clothes, food, and possessions to those in need. One of the most well-known stories about Baha'u'llah and charity is about a poor man who came to him asking for help. Baha'u'llah asked him what he needed, and the man said he needed a new pair of shoes. Baha'u'llah then took off his own shoes and gave them to the man, saying that he had no need for them. Another story is about a woman who came to Baha'u'llah asking for food for her family. He asked her if she had any bread in her house, and she replied that she had a little bit. Baha'u'llah then asked her to bring the bread to him, and he blessed it. When she returned home, she found that the bread had multiplied, and there was enough for her entire family.

Baha'u'llah also encouraged His followers to give voluntary contributions to support charitable causes and to help alleviate the suffering of others. Baha'u'llah taught that the act of giving is itself a

1863 – The above verses were revealed by Baha'u'llah just before He was forced to leave Baghdad for Constantinople (Istanbul), foretell the dark days to come. Baha'u'llah and His companions had set up tents outside Baghdad to celebrate Naw Ruz, the new year.
